

Faculty Senate Charter Preamble A university is a community of scholars engaged in the free discussion, research, and dissemination of ideas and knowledge. The Faculty Senate shall advocate for shared governance in all matters of general policy and may act in an advisory, planning, and consultative role to the University of North Texas at Dallas (UNT Dallas) Administration and the UNT System. The Faculty Senate is the direct voice of the faculty and represents the faculty to the UNT Dallas Administration. Article I. Purposes, Powers and Functions Section 1. Purposes Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate is the direct voice of the faculty and represents the faculty to the UNT Dallas Administration, pursuant to Regents Rule 06.101. Paragraph 2. The Faculty Senate shall advocate for shared governance in all matters of general policy and may act in an advisory, planning, and consultative role to the UNT Dallas Administration, pursuant to Regents Rule 06.102 and Texas Education Code § 51.3523. Section 2. Powers Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate consists of elected and appointed members to represent the General Membership of the Faculty, with at least two representatives from each School and College. One member from each School and College is appointed by the President of the University and the remaining members are elected by the faculty member's respective college or school. Paragraph 2. The Voting Membership of the Faculty elect representatives based upon apportionment of the Schools and Colleges, and Academic Rank. Paragraph 3. The Voting Membership of the Faculty elect four at large members. Paragraph 4: The Faculty Senate will appoint one of the at large members as Parliamentarian. Paragraph 5. The President of the University appoints the Presiding Officer, the

Associate Presiding Officer, and the Secretary of the Faculty Senate from the members

of the Faculty Senate.

47 48 Paragraph 6. The Faculty Senate shall have the power to establish, maintain, and 49 dissolve committees as defined by Article IV. 50 51 Section 3. Shared Governance 52 53 Paragraph 1. As partners in campus governance, the Faculty Senate shall represent the 54 interests of the UNT Dallas faculty in all general academic policy matters, including 55 those related to academic programs, curriculum, instruction, promotion, budget, and tenure. The Faculty Senate may also consider and advise the Institution and System 56 57 administration on other matters relating to the general welfare of the Institution, 58 pursuant to Regents Rule 06.102. 59 60 Section 4. Functions 61 62 Paragraph 1. Subject to formal ratification by the Voting Members of the Senate, the Faculty Senate 63 shall make recommendations in writing pertaining to policies and other matters of shared governance as 64 defined by Regents Rule 06.102. 65 66 Article II. Composition of the General Membership and the Faculty Senate 67 68 Section 1. General Membership 69 70 Paragraph1. The General Membership of the Faculty is composed of full-time and part-71 time faculty, adjunct instructors, and visiting professors. 72 73 Section 2. The Faculty Senate 74 75 Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate is a representative and deliberative body with the 76 majority of the members elected by the voting members of the General Membership 77 and is the direct voice of the faculty at UNT Dallas. 78 79 Section 3. Voting Members of the General Membership 80 81 Paragraph 1. The voting members of the General Membership hold a full-time faculty 82 appointment at UNT Dallas and are receiving at least 50 percent of their university 83 salary; or are full-time visiting faculty members; and may not hold an administrative 84 appointment above the rank of Program Coordinator, Program Director, or Department 85 Chair. 86 87 Section 4. Voting Members of the Faculty Senate 88 89 Paragraph 1. Voting members of the Faculty Senate shall be based on the outcome of 90 Faculty Senate elections and members appointed by the President of the University. 91 92 Paragraph 2. Faculty Senate elected voting members are composed of faculty members 93 from Schools and Colleges of the University. The number of elected voting members 94 from Schools and Colleges will be based on proportional representation

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141	Paragi	raph 1. Elected members shall serve a two-year term, staggered in a manner that

142 allows approximately one-half of the elected members to be elected each year, and may 143 only be re-elected following the second anniversary of the last day of the member's 144 most recent term. 145 146 Paragraph 2: Faculty Senators appointed by the President of the University shall serve a 147 one-year term, and may be reappointed, not to exceed six consecutive terms, and may be reappointed following the second anniversary of the last day of the member's most 148 149 recent term. 150 151 Section 2. Qualifications 152 153 Paragraph 1. Faculty Senators must meet and maintain the qualifications as set forth by 154 Article II, Section 3. 155 156 Section 3. Vacancies 157 158 Paragraph 1. Vacancies of the Faculty Senate may occur when any of the following 159 occurs: (1) an expired term; (2) non-renewal, termination, resignations, or suspension of 160 faculty contract; (3) an Administrative appointment above the rank of Program 161 Coordinator, Program Director, or Program Chair; or (4) removal from Faculty Senate. 162 163 Paragraph 2. Except for expired terms and appointment to an executive officer position, 164 if an elected position is vacated, the Presiding Officer of the Senate shall nominate a candidate to fill the vacated position. A super majority vote of the Faculty Senate is 165 166 required to confirm the candidate. 167 168 Paragraph 3: Except for expired terms, if an appointed senate position is vacated, the President of the University shall appoint a new senator. 169 170 171 Paragraph 4. Vacancies should be filled within 30 days of the vacancy from the 172 respective constituencies of the College or School or Rank as outlined in Article 2, 173 Section 4. 174 175 Paragraphs 5 and 3. Vacancies that occur outside of the academic year should be filled 176 within 30 days of the following academic year. 177 178 Paragraph 6. Vacancies of elected members due to expired terms and appointments to 179 executive officer positions by the President of the Univeristy follow the election process. 180 Section 4. Elections and Appointments 181 182 183 Paragraph 1. Upon ratification of the new Charter, the President, Vice-President, 184 Secretary and Parliamentarian, elected in April 2024 and 2025, would become at large 185 members of Faculty Senate. 186 Paragraph 2. Candidates may only run for one position per election. 187

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 Paragraph 3. Elections week shall be conducted annually by electronic ballot one week before the April Faculty Senate meeting.

Paragraph 4. Candidates who receive the most votes cast in the election shall be notified within 24 hours of the election results and declared the winner for transition of power to begin at the May Faculty Senate meeting.

Paragraph 6. Tie votes will be subject to a run-off election within 3 days of transmission of the election results. All candidates tied for first will be included in the run-off election. Runoff elections will be conducted by electronic ballot for one week.

Paragraph 7. Appointments by the President of the University should be made following the annual election and before the May meeting.

Section 5. Removal of Senator

Paragraph 1. A senator may be removed from the Faculty Senate for the following reasons: more than one unexcused absence in a semester; four or more absences in an academic year; or failure to conduct Senate or faculty responsibilities.

Paragraph 2. Excused absences may include teaching assignments at the University of North Texas at Dallas, academic or professional conferences, academic or professional speaking engagements, and sickness. The Parliamentarian shall maintain detailed attendance records, and a Senator should communicate with the Parliamentarian regarding any excused absence. In the event of a Senator's absence from four regular meetings during an academic year, the Senator shall meet with a member of the Executive Officers to discuss their participation on the Faculty Senate before removal is considered.

Paragraph 3. An elected Faculty Senator may be immediately removed by a two-thirds vote of the voting members of the Senate (vacant Senate seats shall not be counted in determining the two-thirds majority needed for removal of an officer), or upon recommendation by Provost and approval by the President of the University. A motion to remove an elected Senator shall be privileged, taking precedence over any other Senate business. A written motion for removal of an elected Senator listing specific reasons from Paragraph 1 may be introduced by any voting Senator and must be seconded by at least two other Senators in order for a vote for removal to be taken. A twice-seconded motion for removal of an elected Senator shall be considered a first reading of the motion. The vote of Senators on the written motion to remove an elected Senator shall be conducted at the next regularly scheduled Senate meeting, or at a special session of the Senate called for that purpose, to be held no sooner than two weeks after the motion is introduced and seconded. Any Faculty Senator may be removed upon recommendation by the Provost and approval by the President of the University.

Paragraph 4. Members removed for absences cannot run for any open seats for the academic year for which they were removed. Senators removed for reasons other than absences cannot run for Faculty Senate for two academic years after the academic year

Any nomination that does not receive a second from another member 285 of the current Senate body will not be considered viable. 286 287 Paragraph 5. Once nominations have been received, the Parliamentarian (or 288 designee) will generate a ballot for distribution to the current Faculty Senate 289 membership save the Presiding Officer. 290 291 Paragraph 6. Ballots may be paper or electronic but must be individually delivered 292 to the Parliamentarin (or designee). 293 294 Paragraph 7. After tabulating the results for each Candidate, the Parliamentarian (or 295 designee) of the Faculty Senate will release the percentage votes each Candidate received indicating the Candidates who won the endorsements of the Senate. 296 297 298 Paragraph 8. In the instance of a tie between candidates, a second vote following the 299 distribution of voting ballots procedure may be undertaken. Alternatively, a secondary 300 method may be agreed upon by all candidates for the tied position (such as a coin toss, 301 card pull, or other random method) but may only be undertaken if all Candidates for 302 the tied position agree in writing prior to the method being employed to be bound by the method and its results. 303 304 305 Paragraph 9. Within one week, the Parliamentarian will forward the Candidates who 306 won the endorsements for officers of the Senate to the President of the University for review and consideration. 307 308 309 Paragraph 10. The President will then appoint an eligible faculty member. 310 Section 5. Vacancies 311 312 313 Paragraph 1. Vacancies of the Officers of the Faculty Senate occur as set forth by Article 314 III, Section 3. 315 316 Paragraph 2. If a vacancy occurs in the position of the Presiding Officer, the position 317 shall be filled by the Associate Presiding Officer who will serve as Interim Presiding Officer until the President of the University appoints a new Presiding Officer. 318 319 320 Paragraph 3. If a vacancy occurs in the positions of Associate Presiding Officer, the 321 position shall be filled by the Secretary until the President of the University shall appoint a new officer. If a vacancy occurs in the position of the Parliamentarian, the position 322 323 shall be filled through a special election. 324 325 Paragraph 4. Vacancies of elected Faculty Senators due to expired terms follow the 326 election process. 327 328 Section 6. Elections 329

330 Paragraph 1. Before the scheduled March meeting date, the Committee on Nominations 331 and Elections shall receive documented nominations for candidates. The committee 332 shall certify that only qualified candidates appear on the Faculty Senate ballot. 333 Paragraph 2. Nominations for candidates must be seconded. 334 335 336 Paragraph 3. Candidates may only run for one position per election. 337 338 Paragraph 4. Elections week shall be conducted annually by electronic ballot one week 339 before the April Faculty Senate meeting. 340 Paragraph 5. Candidates who receive the most votes cast in the election shall be 341 notified within 24 hours of the election results and declared the winner for transition of 342 343 power to begin at the May Faculty Senate meeting. 344 Paragraph 6. Tie votes will be subject to a run-off election to begin within 3 calendar 345 346 days of transmission of the election results. All candidates tied for first will be included 347 in the run-off election. Runoff elections will be conducted by electronic ballot for one 348 week. 349 350 Section 7. Expectations for Senators 351 352 Paragraph 1. Senators must maintain communication during the academic year with 353 their constituents and present their concerns at Faculty Senate meetings. 354 355 Paragraph 2. Senators are expected to attend all meetings of Faculty Senate, including 356 emergency sessions, during the academic year. 357 358 Paragraph 3. Senators are expected to work collegially and in good faith with the rest of 359 the Senate as the elected representative for their respective constituencies. 360 361 Section 8. Committees 362 363 Paragraph 1. The committees of Faculty Senate shall include the Executive Committee, 364 Standing Committees, and ad-hoc committees, to carry out its work. 365 366 Paragraph 2. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Presiding Officer, 367 Associate Presiding Officer, Secretary, and Parliamentarian. Paragraph 3. Standing Committees shall include the Committee on Academic Affairs, 368 369 Committee on Work-Life, Committee on the Library, Committee on Nominations and 370 Elections, Committee on the Charter and Bylaws, Committee on the Faculty Handbook, 371 and Committee on the Annual Administrator Advisory Review. 372 373 Paragraph 4. Except as hereinafter set forth, the Presiding Officer of the Faculty Senate, 374 in consultation with other officers, may designate committees, each of which will be 375 composed of at least one Faculty Senate voting Member. Any committee, other than

the Standing Committees, will have such duties and responsibilities specified by the

Presiding Officer of the Faculty Senate, in consultation with officers. Committee chairs

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378 shall be elected by the majority of committee members present at the first meeting of 379 the committee. 380 381 Paragraph 5. Except as hereinafter set forth, members on each committee may be 382 appointed by the Presiding Officer of the Faculty Senate, in consultation with other 383 officers. Vacancies in the membership of any committee, (whether by death, 384 resignation, removal, or any other manner), may be filled by the Presiding Officer of the Faculty Senate in consultation with the other officers. Faculty members from each 385 386 School and College or rank may nominate candidate members for any committee. The 387 composition of each committee shall be comprised of one member of the Faculty 388 Senate as an ex-officio member and be representative of the composition of the Faculty 389 Senate as a whole. 390 391 Article V. Meetings and Quorum 392 393 Section 1. Regular Meeting 394 395 Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate shall hold regular meetings as laid out in the bylaws. 396 397 Section 2. Special Meetings 398 399 Paragraph 1. Special meetings of the Faculty Senate may be called by the Presiding 400 Officer on a motion or by a simple majority of the Senators. 401 402 Section 3. Rules and Procedures 403 404 Paragraph 1. The faculty council or senate shall conduct meetings at which a quorum is 405 present in a manner that is open to the public and in accordance with procedures 406 prescribed by the President of the University 407 Paragraph 3. The Faculty Senate will maintain Bylaws that adopt rules for establishing a 408 409 quorum. 410 411 Paragraph 4. Unless otherwise outlined in the Charter, Bylaws, or special rules adopted 412 by the Senate, Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern all meetings of the 413 Senate and committees. 414 415 Paragraph 5. The Faculty Senate will maintain Bylaws that will contain procedures for 416 the Faculty Senate and its committees. 417 418 Paragraph 6: The Faculty Senate shall broadcast over the Internet live video and audio, as applicable, of each open meeting of the senate if more that 50 percent of the 419 420 members of the senate are in attendance. 421 422 Paragraph 7: No later than seven days before a meeting of the Faculty Senate the 423 following will be made available to the public on the Faculty Senate's page on the UNT 424 Dallas website: the agenda for the meeting with sufficient detail to indicate the items 425 that are to be discussed or that will be subject to a vote; and any curriculum proposals

reviewed by the senate that will be discussed or voted on at the meeting. Paragraph 8. The names of members in attendance must be recorded at a meeting in which the senate conducts business related to a vote of no confidence regarding an institution or system administrator or policies related to curriculum and academic standards. Article VI. General Membership Meetings Section 1. Regular General Membership Meetings Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate shall hold regular general membership meetings of Voting and Non-Voting Members of the Faculty Senate, not less than twice per year in each of the Fall and Spring semesters. Paragraph 2. The purpose of the Regular General Membership Meeting is to set the agenda and recommend priorities of the Faculty Senate, including those issues that are to be addressed by the Faculty Senate. Section 2. Special General Membership Meetings Paragraph 1. Special meetings of the General Membership may be called by the Presiding Officer on a motion approved by simple majority of the Senators. Article VII. Amendments Section 1. Charter Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate Charter may be adopted or amended by a super majority vote of the full membership of the Faculty Senate if the proposed Charter amendments were submitted in writing to the Faculty Senate at a prior meeting. Paragraph 2: Amendments to the Faculty Senate Charter must be approved by the President of the University. Section 2. Bylaws Paragraph 1. The Faculty Senate shall adopt Bylaws that it deems necessary to conduct its business, including rules regarding the conduct of elections. Paragraph 2. The Faculty Senate Procedures Manual adopted in May 2022 is henceforth known as the Faculty Senate Bylaws, retaining the purpose and structure stipulated in the motion passed by the Faculty Senate. Paragraph 3. The Faculty Senate Bylaws may be adopted or amended by a simple majority vote of the full membership of the Faculty Senate.
