Our compelling electives include seminars on corrections and police practices, along with a special topics course that you can shape to meet your interests and career goals. You will participate in a capstone project in which you will analyze and develop a practical approach to a significant issue facing the American criminal justice system.

The MSCJ degree will put you on a faster track to promotions, and help you build technical, analytic, and leadership skills essential for long-term career growth or preparation for doctoral programs by enhancing your academic research and professional knowledge.
