Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency in the learning outcomes for the course.

- Orientation & Syllabus Quiz: There will be one (1) orientation & syllabus quiz to be completed in the UNT-Dallas Canvas Learning Management System. The orientation & syllabus quiz (solely based on the orientation & syllabus) includes ten (10) multiple-choice and/or True/False questions. The orientation & syllabus quiz is not timed. The orientation & syllabus quiz includes one (1) attempt. The orientation & syllabus quiz is worth a maximum of five (5) points for a maximum total of five (5) points.
- Meet & Greet Discussion Forum: There will be one (1) Meet & Greet Discussion Forum to be completed in the UNT-Dallas Canvas Learning Management System. For the Meet & Greet Discussion Forum students are required to make one (1) initial post (please only share what you are comfortable with) noting it would be nice if you welcomed your classmates with a response. The Meet & Greet Discussion Forum is worth a maximum of five (5) points for a maximum total of five (5) points.
- Quizzes: There will be thirteen (13) quizzes to be completed in the UNT-Dallas Canvas Learning Management System. Each quiz (solely based on textbook material) includes 10 multiple-choice questions and/or True/False to be answered in a 25-minute timeframe. Each quiz includes two (2) attempts. If a student chooses to take a second quiz attempt, the higher of the two (2) grades will be recorded in the grade book. Each quiz is worth a maximum of ten (10) points for a maximum total of one hundred thirty (130) points.
- Group Discussion Forums: There will be seven (7) group discussion forums (to be completed individually) conducted in a group discussion forum environment to be completed in the UNT-Dallas Canvas Learning Management System. The group discussion forums will initiate with an instructor-posed question. Students must make an initial post and a minimum of two reply posts to their classmates. The reply post requirement necessitates a response to two (2) different members of the class. The Group Discussion Forums will be graded according to the Group Discussion Forum grading rubric (as it appears in Canvas). Note: The purpose of the group discussion forums is to heighten collective awareness and knowledge (noting there is no wrong answer to any question posed and further we are to respect any stated opinion). Continued conversations outside of the classroom are encouraged. All posts should be well thought out and substantive (noting a minimum word count will be enforced for the initial and reply posts). Each group discussion forum is worth a maximum of ten (10) points for a maximum total of seventy (70) points. Note: The group discussion forums may introduce new material (beyond the course textbook) and thus require students to utilize established critical thinking and research skills.

- Data Camp Exercises There will be six (6) Data Camp Exercises to be completed on the Data Camp platform as accessed through the UNT-Dallas Canvas Learning Management System. Complete Data Camp Exercise instructions appear in Canvas. Note: The purpose of the Data Camp exercises is to introduce students to various technologies, applications, and components of the data warehousing environment. For each Data Camp Exercise successfully completed, students will earn a certificate which they can include on their resumes, post on their social media profiles, and share with current or prospective employers. Each Data Camp Exercise is worth a maximum of ten (10) points for a maximum total of sixty (60) points.
- Exams: There will be two (2) exams to be completed in the UNT-Dallas Canvas Learning Management System. The exams (solely based on textbook material) includes 50 multiple-choice questions and/or True/False to be answered in a 150-minute timeframe. Each exam includes two (2) attempts and the highest of the two (2) grades will be recorded in the grade book. Each exam is worth a maximum of fifteen (15) points for a maximum total of thirty (30) points.
