Policy on Late Work

NO LATE WORK WILL BE ACCEPTED. Emergencies will be considered on a case-by-case basis, and you must request permission to submit late work at the earliest opportunity. Requests may or may not be granted (they probably won't). Forgetting to turn in an assignment on time, accidental deletes, uploading the wrong file, not uploading the right format, not having "access to the internet," not being able to use the lockdown browser, etc are not acceptable emergencies. Please double-check that any file you turn in on Canvas is readable. Any files that cannot be read will not be accepted.

Missing assignments- Missing more than two assignments (discussions do not count in this tally) will result in an automatic fail for the course. Additionally, not turning in the final paper on time will result in an automatic fail for the course.

Al Policy for Course: Complete Prohibition of Al Usage

Objective:

The primary goal of this policy is to maintain academic integrity by prohibiting the use of AI tools and services in completing assignments for this course. This includes, but is not limited to, Grammarly and other AI-based writing assistance tools. Assignments submitted with evidence of AI usage will receive a grade of 0 and are subject to further point penalties.

Rationale:

The decision to prohibit AI tools is based on the desire to assess and develop students' independent critical thinking and writing skills. The use of AI tools can compromise the

authenticity of the learning experience and undermine the purpose of assignments, which is to evaluate individual understanding and mastery of the subject matter.

Policy Details:

1. No Al Usage:

- Students are strictly prohibited from using any form of AI, **including Grammarly** or similar tools, in the creation and completion of assignments.
- This policy extends to *any* technology that automatically generates, edits, or suggests content (basically ANYTHING besides basic spell check).

2. Al Detection:

- Assignments will be subject to scrutiny through **several Al detectors** to identify any potential use of Al.
- Detected use of AI will result in an automatic grade of 0 for the assignment and up to a 10-point penalty (a whole letter grade).

4. Student Responsibility:

- It is the responsibility of each student to ensure that their work complies with the class policies.
- Students are expected to thoroughly check their assignments for any unintentional use of Al tools before submission.
- Ignorance or inadvertent use of AI will not be considered as a valid excuse.

5. Awareness of Detectors:

- Students should be aware that various AI detectors are available and will be employed to enforce this policy.
- Ignorance of the existence or capabilities of these detectors will not be considered as a valid defense.

Consequences of Policy Violation:

- Any violation of this policy will result in a minimum penalty of a grade of 0 for the affected assignment and likely a high point penalty of up to 10 points.
- Repeated violations may lead to further disciplinary actions, as deemed appropriate by the instructor.

Note:

This policy is in effect for the entire duration of the course, and students are expected to adhere to these guidelines. Any concerns or questions regarding this policy should be directed to the instructor.
