ATTENDANCE POLICY:

I go by the rule that life happens, and if you have a job (which most of you do), conflicts can develop. That said, I allow three unexcused absences; each unexcused absence after three will result in a loss of two percentage points from your final grade for each missed class. If you email me before class starts as to why you can't make it, I can count that as an excused absence which will **not** result in deductions from your final score.

We're all adults here. I promise to make being in class more fun than not being in class.

LATE WORK POLICY:

I do understand that time and circumstance will sometimes get in the way of you turning in a project on time, but this is also a situation where I need to know in advance that you will be late. If I do not know in advance, I take 25 percent off the total grade for each missed class period. If an assignment is due on a Tuesday and I don't see it until Thursday with no explanation from you, the maximum score you can receive on that assignment is 75 percent. I will deduct an additional 25 percent for each subsequent class period the assignment is late. Again, if you ask around, you'll find I'm the forgiving type, and I'd far rather you turn in good work that belongs in a job search portfolio than garbage that you rushed to get finished. But all assignments are given and explained well before their due dates, so you have plenty of time to start early with me.
