Learning Objectives

The course is designed to address the following four Core Objectives of the Texas Core Curriculum: Critical Thinking Skills, Communication Skills, Social Responsibility, and Personal Responsibility.

	At the end of the course, students will be able to make and defend claims related to historical sources and concepts of various kinds in online threaded discussions with classmates. These responsibilities will

	be demonstrated and assessed in the successful completion of numerous Discussion Activities (see below).
4	Personal Responsibility (PR) - ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.
	At the end of the course, students will be able to apply moral concepts to historical events and ideas. These responsibilities and discernments will be demonstrated and assessed in the successful completion of the Discussion Assignment, "Neutrality and Bias in Historical Analysis".
