Course Catalog Description:	(3) hours. Examines the various cultures that have inhabited Texas from its first settlement by Native peoples to the present. The region began as a crossroads of North America, contested by different Indian groups, European empires, and later Mexico and the United States. The class will also cover major people, events, and processes that shaped Texas' development we will also examine maps, paintings, photographs, and film clips from different eras. Major themes of the course will include Texas' multicultural heritage, cultural contestation over land and identity, and deconstructing powerful regional myths from the Alamo to the Texas Rangers. Course Evaluation Methods

Text Usage:

For this course your primary text will be *History of Texas*. All lectures are aligned with the text to reinforce the material. You will also need to draw upon general knowledge and background gained in readings from the *History of Texas* text for some of the analysis of your essay exams as well as content knowledge for content exam.

Content Exams

There are three content exams each is worth 10% and will be conducted online. Collectively these are worth 30% of the course grade. Content will come from both lectures and assigned readings of *History of Texas* in each course modules.

Essay Exams

Exams for this class will be in a written format and conducted online. These will consist of an essay worth 100%. Students will receive all possible essay questions (4 or 5), which will be covered in each lecture in advance. (You may also find the questions in the study guides.) There are three essay exams (1 per module) and each is worth 15%. Collectively these are worth 45% of the course grade.

Book Review

This assignment will be graded on a standard 0-100% scale same as Essay Exams.

Essay Should Contain the following Elements:

- 250-500 Words (12 point font appx.)
- Bibliographic Entry at the top.
- Give the author's main point.
- Directly quoted material from the book with page number.
- Student name and university affiliation at the bottom of the last page

You will have two attempts with the first being considered a draft with marks for revisions. Complete the revisions for final credit.

Taking Exams

Essays are turned in online. You will have a two hour window in which to do this. This is a Two-Step Process:>>>>

1: Log into the class and click on the “Assignments” menu option. Select the exam you’re taking.

2: For Essay Exams, you will have to upload it via “Turn-It-In.” When you select the essay exam, you will be taken immediately to the Turn-it-in website so I can check for **plagiarism and AI.** (Note: you must use the link to Turn-It-In.com on the course home page. Do not go to Turn-It-In.com to do this.)

Plagiarism & Artificial Intelligence (AI)

I know many of you are studying together, but your essays will have to be independently produced pieces of work that do not use another student's work or overly use another source's information word for word--this includes any use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) software. Make sure what you turn in is your own work. You will not know in advance which essay you are assigned, therefore, gambling on one student you are working with not getting the same essay is a bad idea. ALSO, be advised, Turn-It-In will give me a detailed plagiarism report that will include any internet sources used (absolutely none), any essay previously turned-in to the website, and all other student's essays. In addition, Turnitin will give an AI report showing suspected AI created work (none allowed.) I will also be using other AI detection software.

Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) composition software, such as Chat GPT, is not allowed in this class for any stage or phase of written work, including generation of ideas, writing of text, or rewriting your own work. Doing so is considered a violation of the cheating and plagiarism standards of the UNTD Code of Academic Integrity.

Returning Exams:

Students will receive access to graded exams, exam grades, and comments in 7 to 10 days from the exam's due date. To view your graded exam, go to the turnitin.com link where you originally uploaded it. To view a graded and marked paper, the student user will need to click on the blue “View” button next to the assignment. The student GradeMark paper view will open in a separate window in which the student may view or print the grade and comment information. Not all browsers will be able to display the complete features of the GradeMark product. If a browser that is not fully supported is being used, a notification will come up to inform the user.
