- This assignment is graded as completed or not for the two points available.

Discussion Posts Grading

Guidelines

- By 11:59 PM Thursday write an Initial 200+ word reply to the discussion question.
- By 11:59 PM Saturday, with at least 50 words each, respond to two other posts of students, doing
 your best, adding to the discussion in a meaningful way, not just posting saying you agree. There
 needs to be some depth to the responses.
- Sign your posts with your preferred name and when replying, use the author's original post preferred name as a guide. Let's be friendly Texans!

Grading

- Initial Responses Grading (up to one point):
 - You earn one point if at least 200 words, on topic, posted on time, with good grammar, and appropriate tone.
 - You earn a half point if late, less than 200 words, lacking scholarly tone, or poor grammar.
 - You do not earn points for posts less than 100 words or posted after 11:59 PM Sunday.
- Responses Grading (up to one point):
 - You earn a half point each if at least 50 words, on topic, posted on time, with good grammar, and appropriate tone.
 - You earn a quarter point each if late, less than 50 words, lacking scholarly tone, or poor grammar.
 - You do not earn points for posts less than 25 words or posted after 11:59 PM Sunday.

Weekly Quizzes Grading

- Each guiz contains 15 guestions chosen at random from a test bank.
- You will have up to 30 minutes to complete the exam. One retake is allowed. The highest score will be your final score.
- If you enter the exam for any reason and do not finish, that counts as one of your two attempts. Do not email asking for additional attempts. Be ready before you start. Only start when you are ready. Ready is defined as when you have:
 - read the chapters in the book and taken notes of key topics,
 - reviewed the lecture(s) and your notes of key topics.
 - stable Internet access and there's not a thunderstorm on the way that may cause an outage.
 - a clear schedule, a low chance of interruptions and, recommended but not required, a snack and a beverage of your choice ready so you stay refreshed.
- Late work: Quizzes are due at 11:59 PM Saturday night. Late quizzes are accepted with a one point penalty until 11:59 PM the following Tuesday. You do not have to ask permission to submit a late quiz.

- Each exam contains 50 questions chosen at random from a test bank.
- You will have up to 90 minutes to complete the exam. One retake is allowed. The highest score will be your final score.

Late Exams

- The midterm exam is due at 11:59 PM Saturday night. Late midterms are accepted if submitted by 7 AM on the following Monday, with a 3 point penalty.
- The final exam is due at 11:59 PM Friday night. Late finals are accepted if submitted by 11:59 PM on the following Saturday, with a 3 point penalty.
