Course Overview						
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This course serves as an overview of the major theories and scientific research examining the human mind and behavior and is an introduction to the wide-ranging field of psychology. Since this is a survey course, we will cover a broad view of many studies such as perception, cognition, memory, language, thoughts, development, personality, social interactions, motivation, and abnormal patterns of thoughts and behavior. In addition to covering the major theories of these domains, we will also come to see how psychology affects our everyday life.

3	Ethical and Social Responsibility: Students will be able to apply ethical standards to	
	psychological science and practice and adopt values that build community at local, national, and	
	global levels.	
4	Knowledge Base: Students will be able to describe key concepts, principles, and overarching	
	themes in psychology, and will be able to describe applications of psychology.

Course Policies & Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Exams

There will be a total of **3 exams**. Exams may consist of multiple choice, true/false, fill-in-the-blank, and short essay questions. Exams are not comprehensive. Questions on the exam are based on lecture material and assigned readings. You are responsible for all assigned textbook readings even if they are not covered in lecture. Exams will be completed online in Canvas.

Quizzes

There will be a total of **13 quizzes**. These quizzes are meant to test your knowledge from the readings and past lectures and show what you may need to revisit. They also allow me to assess how the class is doing and what, if any, class material should be covered again.

Quizzes will be administered online and each quiz will have two attempts. Both attempts must be completed by the associate deadlines listed in the course outline. The purpose of allowing two attempts is to for you to review what you missed and learn what the correct answer is through reviewing class materials.

I will drop your 2 lowest quiz grades.

Learning Assignments (LA)

There are a total of **13 Learning Assignments (LA)**. LAs focus on applying textbook content, supplementary materials, and previously assigned course content to yourself or to some novel problem. The purpose of the LAs are to practice pragmatic application, critical thinking, and give some repetition of central course concepts. I recommend reviewing relevant lecture material, clips and/or articles prior to beginning any LA. See the course outline to see which days each LA is due.

1 LA will be dropped.

All LAs will be turned in through Canvas.

Please see the statement at the end of this syllabus regarding the use of AI for course content. In short, it is not allowed unless I deem it so and if AI use is detected it will be considered plagiarism.

Late Work & Missed Exam Policy

<u>Late Passes</u>: All students will have **four** "late passes." These passes can be used to extend the due date of any quiz or LA assignment by one week up until the final deadline. **No assignment or quiz can be extended beyond the final deadline**. Once you have used all your late passes, extensions on any assignment or quiz is subject to the instructor's discretion.

<u>Exams</u>: If you know you will miss an exam, please reach out to me ahead of time so we can arrange the appropriate accommodation. Typically, exams will be made up within a few days. This flexibility is limited and I will not make up any exams beyond a week.

<u>Quizzes and LAs</u>: Submissions past the initial due date will be reduced by 10% per calendar late day (e.g., 20% reduction for an assignment two days late, 30% for three days late, and so on). This can be avoided by using one of the late passes, which extends deadlines by one week.

No assignment or quiz can be extended beyond the final deadline.

The four late passes, dropping one LA and two quizzes are designed to provide flexibility for life events. I do not give extensions beyond the policies listed above, except in extreme circumstances.

Attendance/Participation

Responsibility for class attendance rests with students. Regular and punctual attendance at all scheduled classes is expected. "Attendance" refers to attending the entire class session. Attendance for this course is considered when you are logged in and active in Canvas, i.e., posting assignments, taking quizzes, or completing Discussion Boards. Final Grades: Grades will not be changed after final grades for the semester are submitted, except in cases of documented errors in the computation of a student's total course points earned or in the recording of a student's grade. Students should retain all returned assignments until students have confirmed that the final grade has been computed and reported accurately. Please note that students must earn the exact number of points that correspond with the percentage associated with a particular letter grade to earn that grade.

Incompletes: Incompletes are generally reserved for students who have completed the majority of the coursework, but due to circumstances, are unable to complete the rest of the coursework. An incomplete will be granted at the instructor's discretion. If an incomplete is granted it is the student's responsibility to complete the coursework in accordance with University policy. If an incomplete is not granted, the student is responsible for all of the work assigned in the course during the current semester.
