3	Analyze peer work, and provide constructive critical feedback through discussion forums.				
4	Apply what has been learned through a summative writing exercise and by conducting an Experiential Project.

PROMPTS | 50% of your Overall Grade (Access through Canvas):

You will have four prompts (12.5% for each) due over the span of the term. Each of these prompts will focus on Parts 2-5 of the textbook. There will be more explicit details provided to you in each assignment here within Canvas, so please make sure and go to each module to find out more about what will be expected of you for this portion of your grade.

EXPERIENTIAL PROJECT | 30% of Overall Grade | 100-Point Scale:

For this project, you will have many topics to choose from within the conversation of this class. Ultimately, the purpose is for you is to have an opportunity to take what you have learned and discover something in a real-world setting. Then, you will take what you have discovered, analyze it, then provide an evaluative project to the class.

SUMMATIVE REVIEW | 15% of Overall Grade | 100-Point Scale:

The purpose of this review is to provide a summary of your experience through the four prompts. Here's what you'll do:

- 1. Go back and read through each of your four prompts. As you do, think about how you can adequately summarize the entire experience.
- 2. Next, for each prompt, answer the following questions.

- a. In general, what did I learn about the subject of death & dying that I didn't know beforehand?
- b. What did I specifically learn about my own perceptions of death & dying through this prompt?
- c. How can what I have learned, both generally and personally, help me to potentially grow on a personal level?
- d. How will I use the insight that I have learned here moving forward?
- 3. Lastly, provide some closing thoughts as to the overall experience and any last things you'd like to say about how the process has either helped or not helped.

PLEASE NOTE: There's a 300-word minimum for each prompt. Therefore, your answers for all four questions should total 300. So, your overall total for this assignment should be around 1350 (4 prompts x 300 words + 150 word conclusion).

LATE WORK POLICY:

<u>Due to the nature of most of the assignments, late work will not be accepted. Exceptions may be made on a case-by-case basis (verifiable excuses; example: athletic participation), but no less than a 10% deduction per day that an assignment is late will be credited.</u>
