Course Goals or Overview: The goals of this course are as follows -

The purpose of this course is to explore the dynamics of human personality by examining psychology- based theories and research on a range of different aspects that contribute to a holistic perspective on this subject.

Beyond learning about personality from a general perspective, a major goal of this class is to have you learn more about your own personality. Therefore, throughout the course you will build a personality profile step-by-step as we venture through the core concepts of this topic week-by-week.

Learning Objectives/Outcomes: At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1 Explain the major contributors of human personality.
- Demonstrate deep levels of understanding of these topics by engaging in activities that challenge
 - current levels of perception on the subject matter.
- 3 Analyze established literature through a critical lens.
- 4 Apply what has been learned through writing exercises and practical assessments.

MIDTERM & FINAL EXAMS | 40% of your Overall Grade | 100-Point Scale:

You will have **two exams (each weighing 20% of your overall grade)** over the course of the semester. These exams will include a combination of multiple choice, matching, and true/false questions.

Midterm Exam: This exam will cover Parts 1 & 2 (Chapters 1-4). The exam will be available between 10/5 - 10/19, and you may take it at anytime during the allotted period. It is not a timed exam. However, you only have one opportunity to take it (read "Important" note below for exceptions).

Final Exam: This exam will cover Parts 3 & 4 (Chapters 5-10). The exam will be available between 11/24 - 12/7, and you can take it at anytime during the allotted period. It is not a timed exam. However, you only have one opportunity to take it (read "Important" note below for exceptions).

When you are ready to take each exam, you will do the following:

- **1.** Open the course room within Canvas.
- 2. On the left sidebar, click on the link titled "Quizzes".
- 3. Click on the appropriate Exam.
- 4. Read the instructions for the exam carefully (Quantity of questions, time limit, etc).
- 5. Begin the exam, and don't close the window until you have submitted it.

***IMPORTANT: If you experience technical difficulties during an exam and you get locked out, please email me IMMEDIATELY. I will clear the attempt and allow you to retake it. HOWEVER, it must be prior to NOON of the last day it's due. So, if you wait till after noon of the last day, you run the risk of not getting the exam reset.

PROMPTS | 50% of your Overall Grade | 100-Point Scale:

As mentioned in the *COURSE OBJECTIVES*, you will create a personal personality profile throughout the semester. The purpose of the prompts are to segment this profile into sections and give you specific ideas to consider and tasks to achieve along the way. In the last week of the term, you will compile and submit a summary of the profile. This will be discussed below in the *PROFILE SUBMISSION* section.

You will have four prompts (12.5% for each) due over the span of the term. Each of these prompts will focus on the personality profile that you will be creating throughout the entirety of the course. There will be more explicit details provided to you in the Canvas course room, so please make sure and go there to find out more about what will be expected of you for this portion of your grade.

PROFILE SUBMISSION | 10% of your Overall Grade | 100-Point Scale:

The purpose of this submission is to provide a summary of your findings from the personality profile you will complete throughout the term.

Here's what you'll do:

- 1. Go back and read through each of your four prompts. As you do, think about how you can adequately summarize the entire experience.
- 2. Next, for each prompt, answer the following questions.
 - a. In general, what about perception and cognition did I learn that I didn't know beforehand?
 - b. What did I specifically learn about my own perception through this prompt?
 - c. How can what I have learned, both generally and personally, help me to potentially grow on a personal level?
 - d. How will I use the insight that I have learned here moving forward?
- 3. Lastly, provide some closing thoughts as to the overall experience and any last things you'd like to say about how the process has either helped or not helped.

NOTE: Please don't simply copy and paste your completed prompts one after another and submit that as your submission here. The goal of this submission is to provide you an opportunity to reflect on this experience and what you have learned about yourself.

CONCLUSION:

I hope that you are ready to learn more about personality, and its highly dynamic and powerful influence on the human condition and experience. Again, the goal here is to both 1) learn what has been discovered through established theories and research, and 2) how your own personality has been shaped over time. I encourage you to keep an open mind and challenge yourself to grow as you learn more about this subject and yourself throughout this term.
