Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course. All activities will be turned in on Canvas.

Introduce Yourself:

In the first week of class, you will be asked to provide a personal biography with two peer comments and post in the Discussion section of Canvas. In an online setting it is important that we get to know and welcome one another early in the course so that we can create a sense of community with your instructor and peers. Introductions will be due by 11:59PM Central Time on the assigned date (see course schedule for due dates). Please see Canvas for instructions.

Assignments:

You will be asked to complete individual writing assignments to help you develop and plan for your personal, career, and educational goals (e.g., resume, personal statement, reflection essays). These assignments are in the Assignment section on Canvas. Individual assignments are personal and only the student and professor can see them. Assignments will be posted Day 1 (Monday) of the week in which it is assigned, and due by 11:59 pm Central Time on the assigned date (see course schedule for due dates). You will want to carefully review the Assignment Rubric document located in Canvas. This will be used in evaluating your assignment. Please see Canvas for instructions. Students will be using **APA style** when citing sources within text and preparing a reference list for the Assignments.

Discussions:

You will be asked to answer discussions in the Discussion section of Canvas and comment on your peers' work. These discussions will be related to the weeks' readings from the required textbook. The questions will require critical thinking or application of course topics and will be used to help students stay engaged with their readings, study for their quizzes, and practice writing in **APA style** when citing sources within text and preparing a reference list for the Discussions. Discussions will be posted Day 1 (Monday) of the week in which it is assigned, and due by 11:59 pm Central Time on the assigned date (see course schedule for due dates). You will want to carefully review the Discussion Board Rubric document located in Canvas. This will be used in evaluating your discussion board contributions each week. **Students will NOT be able to make up discussions after the due date to be mindful of everyone's schedule.** Please see Canvas for instructions.

Peer Replies/Comments:

In addition to answering discussions, you will also be required to interact with your peers in the discussions. Your participation grade will consist of replies made to peers. You are welcome, and encouraged, to post more than the minimum required peer replies, as these discussions make the online experience rich and interactive. The purpose of peer interaction is to aid in processing material, to promote class discussion, to emphasize the practical applications of some of the concepts learned in class materials and in your readings, and to build community. Comments should be more than one sentence and should have the following to earn the full credit: (1) paraphrase what you learned from your peer; (2) add information to the discussion; and (3) ask a question related to the discussion. **Students will NOT be able to make up peer comments after the due date to be mindful of everyone's schedule.** Please see Canvas for instructions for number of peers to reply.

Quizzes:

Traditional on-site courses typically have Midterms and Finals. We will have similar Quizzes, only ours will be administered based on individual learning units. Students will complete a multiple-choice quiz independently, and the questions will be based on material taken from the required textbook and course. All Quizzes will be administered via Canvas. You may work on your quiz for several days or in one sitting, and they are not timed. Quizzes are also limited to two attempts. The highest score will be recorded. Due dates for quiz completion are included in the "Course Schedule," and quizzes should be completed by 11:59PM Central Time on the due date. For a midterm grade, the instructor will use the student's current grade as the exam grade.

Extra Credit:

Extra credit of **two points** will be offered to students who attend (1) a UNT-D Career Services workshop or event, (2) receive feedback from the Learning Commons or Career Services on activities that the professor suggests for students to receive feedback on, (3) complete the end of the semester course evaluation, and/or (4) complete other extra credit assigned tasks. Students who attend a UNT-Dallas workshop/event must share their learning experience with their classmates in a discussion post on Canvas. Also, students who use the Learning Commons/Career Services resources must provide a document from the Learning Commons/Career Services with their feedback AND make the recommended changes to earn the two points. Extra credit opportunities will be announced on Canvas or in the "Course Schedule." Please note that extra credit means that the tasks are optional, and this should not affect the student's final grade if they decide not to complete the extra credit.

Late Work Policy:

Make-up activities are allowed with proper documentation (e.g., doctor's note, automobile accident report, funeral announcement, etc.). This documentation will be verified by your instructor, which means that documentation must provide a contact name and number. Exceptions will be made for legitimate emergencies at the instructor's discretion (e.g., illness, death in the family), but only if you contact me immediately. Computer problems, like crashes or lost/corrupted files, are not acceptable emergencies. Be sure to make back-up files of your work. Legitimate make-up work will only be allowed within one week of the missed assignment. If arrangements are not made in a timely manner, I will need documentation (e.g., hospital notice, etc.) explaining the delay. Otherwise, make-ups will not be allowed beyond one week. **Since participation must involve classmates, missed participation for discussions and peer comments cannot be made up after its due date.**

Final Grades:

Grades will not be changed after final grades for the semester are submitted, except in cases of documented errors in the computation of a student's total course points earned or in the recording of a student's grade. Students should retain all returned assignments until students have confirmed that the final grade has been computed and reported accurately. Please note that students must earn the exact number of points that correspond with the percentage associated with a letter grade to earn that grade.

Drop/Withdrawal Policy:

If you are unable to complete this course, you must withdraw from it by **Friday, November 22, 2024**. Withdrawing from a course is a formal procedure, which you must initiate. Therefore, the instructor cannot do this for you. You may withdraw from a class by contacting the Registrar's Office. If you stop attending or are unable to complete this class and you do not withdraw before the official drop date, you will receive a performance grade, usually a grade of "F."
