Course Goals or Overview:

This course will examine a broad range of topics relevant to close relationships, physiological, psychological, and social economic factors involved in marital adjustment, and practical education for marriage and parenthood. Course topics will range from intimacy, marriage and family, diversity in relationships, and family systems theory. Six key qualities of healthy families will be identified and focused on: commitment, appreciation and affection, positive communication, enjoyable time together, spiritual well-being, and the ability to cope with stress and crisis. Empirical research will be explored through writing, student activities, class discussions, and critical thinking exercises.

Course Goals: The goals of this course are as follows:

To develop an understanding of intimacy, including how to develop and maintain close relationships, principles of marriage and family, and ideas, principles, and suggestions for building and keeping intimate relationships.

- 1. Demonstrate a working knowledge of the family systems theory by examining how families maintain themselves, evolve over time, develop separate lives, and maintain family connections.
- 2. Explain how a foundation for growth enables families to face challenges and solve problems they encounter.
- 3. Describe how diversity in structure characterizes families today, including the many different forms that families can take, including diversity in sexual orientation, and families of diverse ethnic and cultural backgrounds.
- 4. Explain how communication facilitates the process of change and growth, with a focus on communication and conflict resolution skills as an essential tool for creating healthy intimate relationships.
- 5. Identify ways in which families learn to function within the larger systems of community and society, by generating ways in which families, communities, and cultures can work together to build a healthier world in the future.

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course. All activities will be turned in on Canvas.

Introduce Yourself:

In the first week of class, you will be asked to provide a personal biography with **two peer comments** and post in the Discussion section of Canvas. In an online setting it is important that we get to know and welcome one another early in the course so that we can create a sense of community with your instructor and peers. Introductions will be due by 11:59PM Central Time on the assigned date (see course schedule for due dates). Please see Canvas for instructions.

Assignments:

You will be asked to complete individual writing assignments to help you reflect on the readings and apply the assignments to your personal, career, and educational goals. These assignments are in the Assignment section on Canvas. Individual assignments are personal and only the student and professor can see them. Assignments will be posted Day 1 (Monday) of the week in which it is assigned, and due by 11:59 pm Central Time on the assigned date (see course schedule for due dates). You will want to carefully review the Assignment Rubric document located in Canvas. This will be used in evaluating your assignment. Please see Canvas for instructions. Students will be using **APA style** when citing sources within text and preparing a reference list for the Assignments.

Discussions:

You will be asked to answer discussions in the Discussion section of Canvas and comment on your peers' work. These discussions will be related to the weeks' readings from the required textbook. The questions will require critical thinking or application of course topics and will be used to help students stay engaged with their readings, study for their quizzes, and practice writing in APA style. Students will be using **APA style** when citing sources within text and preparing a reference list for the Discussions. Discussions will be posted Day 1 (Monday) of the week in which it is assigned, and due by 11:59 pm Central Time on the assigned date (see course schedule for due dates). You will want to carefully review the Discussion Board Rubric document located in Canvas. This will be used in evaluating your discussion board contributions each week. **Students will NOT be able to make up discussions after the due date since students typically move on to the next week's discussion activities. Please see Canvas for instructions.**

Peer Replies/Comments:

In addition to answering discussions, you will also be required to interact with your peers in the discussions. Your participation grade will consist of replies made to peers. You are welcome, and encouraged, to post more than the minimum required peer replies, as these discussions make the online experience rich and interactive. The purpose of peer interaction is to aid in processing material, to promote class discussion, to emphasize the practical applications of some of the concepts learned in class materials and in your readings, and to build community. Comments should be more than one sentence and should have the following to earn the full credit: (1) paraphrase what you learned from your peer; (2) add information to the discussion; and (3) ask a question related to the discussion. **Students**

will NOT be able to make up peer comments after the due date since most students move on to the next week's activities. Please see Canvas for instructions for the number of peers to reply.

Quizzes:

Traditional on-site courses typically have Midterms and Finals. We will have similar Quizzes, only ours will be administered based on individual learning units. Students will complete a multiple-choice chapter quiz independently, and the questions will be based on material taken from the required textbook and course. All Quizzes will be administered via Canvas. You may work on your quizzes for several days or in one sitting, and they are not timed. Quizzes are also limited to two attempts. The highest score will be recorded. Due dates for quiz completion are included in the "Course Schedule," and quizzes should be completed by 11:59PM Central Time on the due date. For a midterm and final test grade, the instructor will use the student's current grade.

Extra Credit:

Extra credit of **two points** will be offered to students and will be announced on Canvas or in the "Course Schedule." Please note that extra credit means that the tasks are optional, and this should not affect the student's final grade in a negative way.

Otherwise, make-up will not be allowed beyond one week. Since participation must involve classmates, missed participation for discussions and peer comments cannot be made up after its due date.

Final Grades:

Grades will not be changed after final grades for the semester are submitted, except in cases of documented errors in the computation of a student's total course points earned or in the recording of a student's grade. Students should retain all returned assignments until students have confirmed that the final grade has been computed and reported accurately.
