Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Attendance and Participation (25%)

Class participation will be assessed regularly throughout the semester (unannounced) and will be based on communicative activities carried out during class time. There will be a minimum of one class participation grade per chapter, although more participation grades may also be given at the discretion of the instructor. Students who are absent on the day of a class participation grade will receive a zero for participation on that day. Exemptions from class participation grades are only given to students who provide an excuse on university letterhead or who miss a class due to active duty military obligations.

Quizzes and homework (30%)

Homework (reading, taking notes, completing homework activities, etc.) is vital to the quantity and quality of your participation in class.

We will have a quiz for each topic that covers vocabulary, a grammar point, and other content studied during that portion of the course. Students will not be allowed to retake or makeup Chapter Quizzes, unless the student can provide proper documentation.

Oral Presentations (15 %)

Students will be required to present on the topic studied in class daily. Students will also be required to do formal presentations on research topics.

Writing assignments (15%)

Students will have to keep a journal on each class session to take notes. Notes should be used on compositions and projects. No late work will be accepted, unless documentation for the delay is provided.

Exams (20%)

Exams are designed to enhance que quality of learning. All exams are written and is a vital part of the course. No

makeups will be given.

Exam policy: Quizzes should be taken as scheduled. No makeup examinations will be allowed except for documented emergencies (See Student Handbook).
