<p><b>Course Overview:</b> This course on Afro-Latino culture is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the diverse cultures, histories, and experiences of Afro-Latinos throughout the Latin Americas. Drawing on interdisciplinary approaches from history, anthropology, sociology, and cultural studies, this course will explore the intersections of race, ethnicity, culture, and identity within the Afro-Latino community. Students will critically examine the social, political, and economic contexts that have shaped Afro-Latino identities and explore the contributions of Afro-Latinos to art, literature, music, and social activism.</p>

### Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

**20% - Class Participation:** Students should actively contribute to class and group discussions both by asking and answering questions; it also means that students should willingly engage in class activities and always use the language of the course, i.e., Spanish. All students are expected to also attend any scheduled virtual meeting and arrive on time. Absence from class will affect students' grade, as will tardiness, early departures, and regularly entering and leaving the virtual room while class is in session.

Students who are absent on the day of a class participation grade **will receive a zero for participation on that day.**

Exemptions from class participation grades are only given to students who provide an excuse on university letterhead or who miss a class due to active duty military obligations.

**20% - Homework:** Students are responsible for preparing all reading and writing assignments before coming to class or before completing assessments.

**20% - Exams:** Writing assignments are an essential part of this course. Essays are designed to measure performance on the different modes of writing.

**20% - Essays:** The test will take place after the classroom instruction for the lesson has ended.

**20% - Oral Presentations:** Oral presentations are designed to measure ability to apply presented course material on the research topic assigned in the class. All students are expected to present multiples times during the semester. Due to the nature of our course, no makeups will be given.
