Course Goals

The goal of this course is to develop students' ability to use advanced Spanish in legal contexts by integrating linguistic proficiency, cultural competence, and professional practice. By the end of the semester, students will be able to analyze and interpret legal documents in Spanish, engage in simulated client—attorney interactions, conduct research relevant to Hispanic legal issues, and apply their skills in real-world or community-based scenarios to promote equitable access to justice.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. **Apply advanced Spanish legal terminology** to interpret, draft, and analyze documents such as contracts, affidavits, and pleadings.
- 2. **Demonstrate effective oral communication skills** in Spanish through simulated client–attorney interactions, interviews, and courtroom scenarios.
- 3. **Conduct legal research in Spanish**, evaluating statutes, case law, and secondary sources from Hispanic jurisdictions to compare with U.S. legal systems.
- 4. **Critically assess the role of language and culture in access to justice**, producing a research project that connects Spanish proficiency with ethical and professional responsibilities in the legal field.

Skills Learned in the Course

1. Legal Terminology Mastery

 Accurately using specialized Spanish vocabulary in areas such as contracts, criminal law, immigration, and family law.

2. Bilingual Legal Communication

 Conducting client interviews, consultations, and courtroom simulations effectively in Spanish.

3. Legal Translation & Interpretation

Translating and interpreting documents (e.g., affidavits, contracts, witness statements)
 with precision and cultural sensitivity.

4. Comparative Legal Research

 Researching and analyzing Spanish-language legal sources and comparing Hispanic legal systems with the U.S. system.

5. Professional & Ethical Application

 Applying language skills to real-world scenarios that enhance access to justice and demonstrate awareness of cultural and ethical responsibilities.

Course Evaluation Methods

This course will utilize the following instruments to determine student grades and proficiency of the learning outcomes for the course.

Attendance and Participation: synchronous and asynchronous presence is a vital portion of the course.

Exams: written tests designed to measure knowledge of presented course material.

Quizzes and Activities: written and oral assignments designed to supplement and reinforce course material.

Essays: essays are designed to measure formatted written knowledge of the theme covered. **Aural and Oral Assessments:** - aural and oral presentation(s) designed to measure ability to apply presented course material on the research topic assigned in the class.
