- 4 Students will demonstrate the ability to communicate orally in formal contexts
- 5 Students will demonstrate the ability to understand and analyze literature written in the target language.
- 6 Students will use specialized vocabulary in context

Course Evaluation Methods

Participation (30%)

Quizzes and online activities (20%)

Writing assignments (15%)

Assignments are designed to measure and reinforce the development of language proficiency **Exams** (20%)

Written and oral tests designed to measure knowledge of presented course material
