Late Work

An open line of communication with your instructor is one of the best ways to ensure academic success.

Participation, Engagement & Attendance

Students are expected to attend each class as attendance will be taken daily. A student will be considered absent if they arrive more than 10 minutes late for a session. Beginning with the second unexcused absence, 15 points will be deducted from the student's final Attendance & Participation grade for each additional unexcused absence. Only documented cases of illness, bereavement, or participation in university-sponsored events may be excused at the discretion of the instructor.

Because attendance is vital to success in this class, more than 3 unexcused absences will result in the student receiving a failing grade in the course.

In addition to the outside-of-class work, part of the learning in this course will occur with the community of your peers and the instructors, so it is important for both your own learning and your classmates' that you attend the class sessions and are on time. We look forward to your contributions and getting to know you throughout the course. If you feel nervous or shy about whole class discussions, please email an instructor to discuss how we can help mitigate anxiety or concerns about participation in class. There are a variety of ways for students to be actively engaged in the class sessions and to contribute to your classmates' learning.

Refer to the Attendance Policy below as needed. You are allowed to miss one class. **Students who have no more than one absence are eligible to receive as many as 15 points.** The remaining points are awarded for engaged participation in class as determined by the following criteria:

- <u>12-15 points</u>: student consistently contributes relevant comments or questions each week and is prompt, respectful, and attentive.
- <u>8-11 points</u>: students occasionally contributes relevant comments or questions during class, demonstrates limited engagement, and is prompt and respectful.
- <u>4-7 points</u>: student demonstrates little engagement with course content or peers, is frequently off-task and unorganized with comments, and lacks decorum.
- **0-3 points**: student is disengaged, unorganized, and disruptive in class.

If the instructor deems any of them to be inappropriate or offensive, I will forward the message to the chair of the department and appropriate action will be taken, not excluding expulsion from the course. - Original Analysis: Do not use AI to perform critical analysis of a text, event, or concept. This work must demonstrate your own understanding and interpretation.
- Creating "Your" Voice: Do not use AI to write content that is meant to represent your personal perspective, opinions, or voice.

Permitted Uses of AI

- Brainstorming: You may use AI to generate ideas or topics to explore.
- Drafting & Editing: You may use AI for grammar and spelling checks, or to rephrase sentences for clarity.
- Information Gathering: You may use AI to summarize articles or explain complex concepts, but you must cite your sources and verify the information.

All work submitted must be your own. Using Al in a way that misrepresents your own reflection, analysis, or personal voice will be considered a violation of academic integrity. If you have any questions about appropriate Al use, please ask.

<u>Web-based Plagiarism Detection</u>: Please be aware in some courses, students may be required to submit written assignments to Turnitin, a web-based plagiarism detection service, or another method. If submitting to Turnitin, please remove your title page and other personal information.

Classroom etiquette:
